# Our collections of distinction

Special Collections and Archives on the MCV Campus and the Monroe Park Campus house distinctive collections of rare publications and primary source materials. These include:

Manuscripts Multiple formats spanning the 19th to the 21st centuries offer subjects including Richmond history; African-American, women's and LGBTQ community histories; social movements and activism; architectural history and urban planning; and literary manuscripts and materials that document the health sciences and the health care professions in Virginia.


Books and periodicals Dating primarily from the late 19th century to today, subject areas include Richmond authors; Richmond history; fantasy and science fiction; graphic novels and comics reference; book arts and movable books; underground publications; and works concerning the history of medicine, dentistry, pharmacy, nursing and other related health care fields.

**Book art** International in scope and recognized for its comprehensiveness, the collection includes all aspects of contemporary artists' publications (sculptural bookworks, fine press editions, multiples, zines and photobooks); rare serial publications; concrete and visual poetry; altered and movable books; and correspondence art.

**Comic arts** One of the largest collections of its kind in the country includes comic books, reference titles, journals, graphic novels, underground publications, original art, and papers and collections of comic artists and scholars.

Medical artifacts The health sciences library on the MCV Campus manages two centuries of medical, surgical and dental instruments, including uniforms of health practitioners, diagnostic and therapeutic devices, and medical furnishings.

University archives Materials with historic significance and continuing fiscal, legal and administrative value date from the 19th century and include records and other documentation from VCU's predecessor institutions, Richmond Professional Institute and the Medical College of Virginia.





# Hidden costs and preservation concerns

Public funding provides basic support for operations and services but goes only so far. We face innumerable challenges that public funding cannot support, including:

- Permanent collections incur ongoing costs associated with proper storage and environment. Archival boxes and folders to house one shelf of personal papers costs about \$100.
- Organic materials can decay from age or use and require preservation and conservation. Costs vary.
- Audiovisual materials need preservation in stable formats. Conversion of one 16mm film can cost **\$800** or more.
- Digital collections require special software, large volume storage and conversion to standardized preservation file formats. A 16 terabyte hard drive costs about \$700.
- Organizing and describing collections of all formats to professional standards is technically complex and labor intensive. The salary for a one-year project archivist is about \$45,000.
